Regional councils coordinate and work to streamline statewide services at the regional level, leverage federal resources and serve as stewards of Ohio's limited resources.

The Role of Ohio Regional Councils

Regional councils have been an integral part in helping various state administrations over the last five decades implement their programs and policies at the local level, including transportation, job development, environmental protection, aging services, housing, weatherization, and local government collaboration.

Regional councils have enormous potential in helping make state and local government more efficient and effective in the delivery of services. Some of the areas where Regional councils have a role include:

Most of Ohio's regional councils are either Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) or Regional Transportation Planning Organizations (RTPOs) that bring local officials together to determine transportation priorities and how to allocate federal transportation dollars. Six of the councils are Areawide Water Quality Management Planning Agencies, designated under the Clean Water Act and certified by the Governor of Ohio. However, all the councils have long histories of coordinating transportation, environmental, and land-use planning, and helping local initiatives within the framework of state policy.
